
High Street - front and back

- Old Baptist Chapel -The doctors' surgery is on the site of the Baptist Chapel (built 1817). The old Chapel doorway is preserved inside the surgery.
- Glebe Pond -This pond was filled with dumped material from Holy Trinity church, when it was restored in 1872.
- **3. Ridge and Furrow** -The remains of old ploughing techniques can still be seen in the pasture called Ron Sulman's field.
- 4. Listed Barn Dates to the 1700s.
- Maltings and Brewery 62 High Street was built as a maltings in 1730s, became a brewery in 1865 and is now a family home.
- 6. Farms on High St All the properties on the west of the High Street run from the street to the fields; many used to be farms, as No. 52 still is.
- **7. Girls and mixed infant school** 22 High Street, built in 1861.

Haddenham Purple Walk



Grade II Listed Barn on Aldreth Road

This walk goes through the Non-Conformist cemetery, laid out in 1864, along the footpath at the back of houses on the High Street, with fields on the right, and up to Aldreth Road, to the listed barn. From there the walk passes many 19th century houses, but also some that hide much earlier origins. There is a lot more to see than has been possible to include in this short leaflet.

Haddenham History Walks

From the Green the footpath runs through the Non-Conformist Cemetery (1864), with the Doctor's Surgery on the left. The Old Baptist Chapel (1), built in 1841, used to be there; all that is left is the doorway preserved in the Surgery waiting room! At the bottom of the cemetery a track runs along the backs of the High Street properties, which would have been a busy thoroughfare when everyone used to walk everywhere, with cut-throughs onto the High Street. About 100 yards along this path, where the fields open out on the right, there used to be a large pond (2) on the left, filled in with rubbish from the 1872 restoration of the church. Through another kissing gate the track runs alongside Bottom Field where the remains of old ploughing methods, ridge and furrow (3), can be seen. The footpath sign shows the narrow way onto to High Street, by the side of an 18th century listed barn (4). Further up on the left is (No. 62) the maltings and brewery (5) which have been converted into a family home. There used to be many farms (6) that ran from the High St down to the back lane, such as No. 52. Many interesting 19th century properties can be seen on the way up to the Girls and Mixed Infants School (7), at No. 22, built in 1861. Continuing up the High Street takes in the Methodist Church, rebuilt in 1891.
